

'ESPERANTO DAY' IN CONWY

The town of Conwy in North Wales has a beautiful castle, built on the orders of Edward I. It also has a new mayor, Bill Chapman JP, a long-time member of EAB and active promoter of Esperanto.

Bill is delighted to be able announce that in his capacity as *Mayor of Conwy and Custodian of Conwy Castle*, he has arranged for an 'Esperanto Day' to take place at the Guildhall on October 21st.

The day's activities will include a tour in Esperanto of the artworks in the Mayor's Parlour and a walk around the medieval town walls. The latter, of course, if the weather allows it; I'm afraid the mayor's influence doesn't extend quite that far.

Within the Guildhall there will be various talks and presentations, including a class for beginners and near-beginners by EAB's Jack Warren, and a discussion group on topical issues led by Tim Owen.

The event itself will be free to attend, and Bill has sourced a very pleasant venue for lunch on the day. If you wish to join him there, the cost will be £8, which promises to be a bargain.

The event will take place at the Guildhall, Rose Hill Street, Conwy, LL32 8LD. Bill advises that if you're travelling by train, the Guildhall is a short walk from Llandudno Junction and Conwy, but that Conwy is a re-



quest stop and not all trains will stop there. Please be aware if you need to book overnight accommodation and search for it online that Conwy is the name of the county as well as the town, so you may end up with something several miles away.

LA GRANDA ELDONO

The masterpiece of John Francis, a member of the *skota skolo* of Esperanto poets, is newly available for purchase, having been out of print since its initial print run, despite rave reviews and forlorn calls for a reprint.

Thanks to the efforts of a small team of volunteers, and in particular to Hugh Reid, who spearheaded the project and did the lion's share of the work, *La Granda Kaldrono* is now available at a very low cost.

In reviewing the original version, Sten Johansson wrote 'Pli ol ĉiu ajn alia verko Esperanta, ĝi meritis reel-donon'. Thanks to lots of hard work, that last word should now be changed to *aĉeton*.

This new version is electronic and will work with Amazon Kindle and other ebook readers. Since Amazon declined to offer a book in an 'unsupported language', EAB is hosting the files. If you buy it you can download either electronic version, plus choose extra files written in the Zamenhof-approved h-system if your reader is an older one which can't handle Esperanto's accented characters.

At only £5 for 592 pages, it represents great value. Treat yourself to a bargain by heading to espinfo.org/kaldrono. A review will be in the next edition of *La Brita Esperantisto*.



Wasn't Edinburgh nice? Lots of smiling faces, indeed several new ones, and a good number of people travelling from abroad to participate as presenters and enjoy as regular attendees.

I think we got a good balance of speakers. Viktoro Solé went down very, very well, as did Andrew Weir, a Scotsman now living in Norway. Betty Chatterjee, who visited from Denmark, was very likeable in her presentation about the Danish concept *hygge* (which seems to be popping up all over the place this week!), Jorge Camacho was kind enough to put on a couple of poetry workshops, and our own Jack Warren made his Powerpoint debut. We even had a film première, *La mirindaĵoj de Clarence Bicknell*, a short film in preparation for the centenary of the death of one of the Esperanto pioneers, and for years the only Esperantist in Italy.

The venue, the Melting Pot, was very good, particularly because it had a large workspace into which people could flow. And the food on offer was of a higher standard than I think we've been used to. We'll definitely have to keep it in mind for the next time we go back to the Scottish capital. Thank you to our colleagues north of the border for agreeing to team up with us.

AND FOR 2018?

Next year we'll be heading to Aberystwyth, a historic market town in the west of Wales. As *Update* goes to press we haven't yet chosen a particular venue, so I can't give details about the when and where, but there are a few different ones which are under consideration.

ESPERANTO TURNS 130

AMIKUMU LAUNCHED

The team behind the app Amikumu launched without a hitch exactly as planned. Take-up was immediately particularly good (23 of the 61 in attendance in Edinburgh had accounts) and the app was put to use very quickly. I used it to set up a get-together in Nuneaton, for example, thinking I'd be the first, and then finding out that quite a few others had pipped me to it. It definitely works.

DUOLINGO REACHED 1 MILLION

The Esperanto for English-speakers course on Duolingo launched in May 2015. A second course, this time for Spanish-speakers, was designed shortly afterwards and is now live. Between them they have over one million learners.

It won't be long before the original English-speaker course hits 1 million by itself. That'd be a fabulous result in what will be under two and a half years.

Since the Spanish version went live, a third course, this time for Portuguese-speakers, is in development and is expected to be ready in December. The decision to use that particular language is attributable to Brazil being a relatively strong area for Esperanto, although wouldn't it be nice if the 100,000th learner of the Portuguese course were at the 2018 Universala Kongreso in Lisbon?

LEARNER SESSIONS IN LONDON

You know who else has been seeing a burst of activity recently? The London Esperanto Club thanks, in particular, to Anna Lowenstein, who has been running beginners' courses, following a successful evening in which beginners were invited to attend a special welcome session. It wasn't only beginners who emerged but also veterans who had been absent for a while, putting attendance into the 40 range, I gather. Well done to all involved.

That original evening led to a series of beginner-friendly sessions taking place, and has now seen some post-beginner classes, run by Renato Corsetti, also become a regular event.

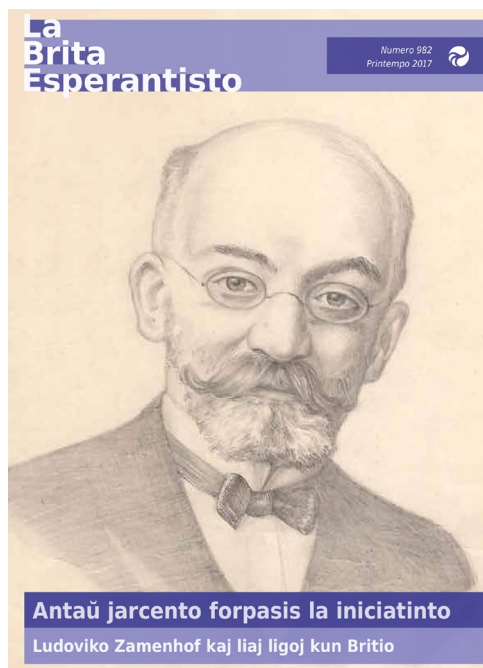

The government operates a Gift Aid scheme, which allows UK charities to claim back the basic rate tax already paid on donations by the donor. The 2014 and 2015 AGMs contained a resolution from a member concerned about formalising the existence of the Butler Library. In the 2016 AGM members asked the trustees to consider ways in which something could be incorporated into the charity's governing document (constitution) to formalise EAB's responsibility for protecting the cultural heritage of Esperanto.

In response I have led discussions among the trustees in which we came to the conclusion that the best way of achieving this would be to incorporate some mention of this responsibility into EAB's charitable purpose, which I have subsequently looked into.

All charities must have a charitable purpose (also known as a charitable object), which defines what the charity is set up to achieve. A charitable purpose must fall within one or more of the 13 descrip-

tions of charitable purposes listed in the Charities Act and it must be clear how it is for the public benefit.

EAB's current charitable purpose is defined in its constitution as follows:

The Object of the Association shall be to advance the education of the general public in and about the international language Esperanto, in furtherance of international communication without discrimination, and of the natural right of all people and peoples, their languages and cultures to be treated equally.

During the recent trustee working weekend in Barlaston, the trustees came up with the following revised wording:

The Object of the Association shall be to advance education in and about the international language Esperanto and to preserve and promote the culture and heritage of Esperanto for the educational benefit of the general public.

Formally changing EAB's purpose would require the approval of the Charity Commission and also approval of a revised constitution incorporating the new wording at the next AGM. Before we take the proposal any further, we are therefore keen to get feedback, whether positive or negative, from members on the wording above. The trustees will discuss feedback received and the best way forward when they meet again on November 4th.
