# **ABERYSTWYTH AWAITS YOU IN APRIL**

We're delighted to be able to let you know that we won't be holding a *Brita Kongreso* next year. That's right; *delighted*. Why?

Because we're offering something even better ... and you're all invited! We'll be hosting a **Brita kaj Tutkelta Kongreso** at the Morlan Centre in Aberystwyth. It will be a longer event than the usual conferences because we're going to pack it with fun activities. We'll be starting on **Friday, April 13**<sup>th</sup> and closing the event on Tuesday the 17<sup>th</sup>. Best of all? The extra days on the end are free! You'll pay the same standard kotizo that people going home on the Sunday will.

Because of the extra length, we won't be closing the conference venue in the afternoon on the Sunday, so if you need to arrange travel home, bear in mind that the venue will be open until 21:00 if you're able to get something later.

#### PRESENTATIONS

We'll be opening with a bang on the Friday night courtesy of local band **Bois y Fro**, who will provide an introduction to Welsh music.



That will be a case of starting as we mean to go on; we'll be making Welsh a focal point of the event. Dr Paul Birt, Acting Chair of Celtic Studies and Visiting Professor at the University of Ottawa, Canada, will be speaking in Esperanto on work to increase the number of speakers of Welsh to one million. He'll also highlight the challenges facing the Cornish language, whose last recorded speaker, Dolly Pentreath, died in 1777, before relatively recent efforts to revive it brought it back to life.

You'll get to hear Welsh, as Mike Parker gives you an introduction to Wales in the Welsh language, interpreted into Esperanto. And there will be introductions in Esperanto to the Welsh language, so you'll have the opportunity to learn some of it.

And you'll also get to learn something about the Celtic nation which lies outside of the British Isles, as speakers from Brittany present the sea-faring and dance tradition of their nation. *Plus* our own Ed Robertson will share some knowledge of the Picts.



**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT** In the last issue, Clare Hunter wrote about a proposal that the trustees are making to change the charity's object. She invited feedback at clare.hunter@ esperanto. org.uk.

So far she's only received comments from two people: one was supportive, and the other didn't think the change went quite far enough, but was otherwise supportive. Is that it? Should the trustees assume tacet approval? If you have an opinion or indeed would like to approve the idea, please let Clare know.

The proposal to amend the charity's object was born from a resolution submitted by a member to the 2014 and 2015 AGMs, aiming to formalise the existence of the Butler Library. In the 2016 AGM members asked the trustees to consider

ways in which something could be incorporated into the charity's governing document (constitution) to formalise EAB's responsibility for protecting the cultural heritage of Esperanto.

Taking this on board, Clare undertook the relevant research and led discussions among the trustees. The conclusion was that the best way of achieving this would be to incorporate some mention of this responsibility into EAB's charitable purpose.

There are certain things which must be clear in the charitable purpose; it must be seen to be for the benefit of the public and fall within one or more of the 13 descriptions of charitable purposes listed in the Charities Act.

EAB's current charitable purpose is defined in its constitution as follows: *The Object of the Association shall be to ad*- vance the education of the general public in and about the international language Esperanto, in furtherance of international communication without discrimination, and of the natural right of all people and peoples, their languages and cultures to be treated equally.

The trustees propose to revise this to: The Object of the Association shall be to advance education in and about the international language Esperanto and to preserve and promote the culture and heritage of Esperanto for the educational benefit of the general public.

Formally changing EAB's purpose would require the approval of the Charity Commission and also approval of a revised constitution incorporating the new wording at the next AGM. What do you think?


