
SEE YOU AT THE KUNKONGRESO

April 12th - 16th 2019



There are only a few weeks left before our centenary conference when, together with our friends at Esperanto France, we will commemorate the first ever international Esperanto get-together in 1904. The event is set to be truly international this year, judging not only by the guests who have already enrolled but also by the speakers and entertainment coming from different corners of Europe.

The programme is getting richer all the time and three new items have been added to it since the last issue of Update to make for a meaty last day of the official programme on the Monday: First there will be a presentation on the **Akademio** by academy member Bertilo Wennergren.

A presentation on the new UEA website dedicated to beginners and improvers, **uea.facila.org**, will follow.

In the afternoon, our guests **Bertilo & Birke** will bring you an Esperanto concert and singsong to provide an entertaining end to the *Kunkongreso*. In the evening, participants are invited to an optional group meal after the official end of the event.

For much more on the programme, the speakers the excursions and the venue, do not forget to visit the website **britakongreso.org**, where you can also sign up for the coference itself and for the various extra activities on offer.

The conference will run from 12th April to 16th April (registration from 18:00 on the 12th) at The Ark Dover, Noah's Ark Road, Dover, Kent, CT17 0DD. The participation fee is £50, which includes your entrance to the conference, a buffet on the Friday night and tea, coffee & biscuits during the Saturday and Monday sessions.

It is also possible to pay a little extra for a light lunch on the Saturday and the Monday, to book you reenactement excursion to Calais, or the local trip to Dover Castle and the Cliffs, and to book the group meal on the Monday Evening.

NOTES FROM THE TRUSTEE MEETING IN FEBRUARY

It had been four months since the trustees' previous meeting and so on a cold February morning and with the smells of the countryside in the Barlaston air, Clare Hunter, Damon Lord and I met up at Esperanto House, along with Richard Smith, who is standing for election and came to meet the trustees he hopes to be working with. Edmund Grimley Evans, Ed Robertson, Lajo Miller and Kathryn Newbould joined us by Skype and so were presumably spared the aroma to which the rest of us were subjected.

After the usual formalities were cleared, Clare Hunter took centre stage. EAB's indispensable Treasurer reported on a number of things which she's been working on between meetings. She informed us that the annual independent examination had come to a successful conclusion and invited us to submit queries or comments on the Trustees' Annual Report and financial statements, which she had previously circulated. We were all happy to approve them and so Clare signed them.

EAB's year came to an end between meetings. Well, yes, December went and January came, as for everybody else in the western world. What I'm referring to, though, is EAB's financial year, which ends on October 31. This means that Clare could definitively report on the Charity's financial performance. Income and expenditure were broadly in line with what Clare had predicted when she set the budget the year before, with the Charity making a surplus of £2000. Clare underlined to us that the accounts don't make this obvious, since a change to accounting practices a few years ago means that the bottom line has to bear in mind something called "unrealised gains". To me that's like looking at your own income and expenditure in the year and then adding on how much the value of your house has increased, even though you haven't sold it, so you haven't actually had it as income. But that's how things are. With £2m of investments, a small percentage change could actually represent tens of thousands of pounds, so Clare was very keen to point out the real figure: EAB took in £2,000 more than it received in the year.

Clare reported that she and Edmund had had a meeting with an investment manager from CCLA, summarising the content of the meeting. She had also drafted and circulated an investment policy prior to the meeting, which the trustees will discuss at their working weekend in April. She shared with us the news that Vivienne Isherwood had kindly left a large legacy for EAB in memory of her sister, Kathleen Hopkins. And after summarising all that hard work, Clare the Indefatigable still had the attention to detail to respond to a question raised in the AGM about how much the management charges are on EAB's investment portfolio. These are 0.5% to 0.75%, depending on which of the four funds you're looking at.

Education and Publicity

Tim Owen joined the meeting and referred to a lengthy report circulated by him in advance. It was lovely to see that we've welcomed such a wide range of teachers and that the next session of Lernu and Lernu Plu would be led by people who have graduated from our system, Maurizio and Chris. For once I can think "I can remember when they were nobbut beginners" and not feel old! What a great testament to Esperanto that these two have made such progress (including C1 certificates) in such a short time. I'm delighted to see them giving back to our community! It's amazing to think they've done so well without yet heading overseas with the language.

Speaking of which... if you haven't yet used Esperanto overseas, you might be interested to know that we've relaunched the bursary scheme which we trialled successfully last year. It was a little late in the day because details about when and where the next session of Somera Esperanto-Studado would be taking place have only just come out (the organisers were hoping to get a proposal from Czechia to prevent a clash with the IJK in Slovakia) but Tim reported that he'd set up the site and form for people interested in attending with £200 from EAB to help cover costs in the days before the meeting, as soon as the date and location were announced.  $\,$ Tim confirmed that EAB will be back at the Language Show in London in

November after a few years away. Earlier trustees had felt that the event had grown away from what it used to be and had become something for professional firms with huge budgets. However, the event is in new hands now so, with the help of some local Esperantists volunteering their time, we're going to try it again.

Conference

We received an update on progress for the *Kunkongreso* in Dover. Numbers from the UK are OK but there's still lots of spare capacity. We noticed that the hotel prices haven't changed from when we booked our own accommodation months ago, so it's not too late to sign up! We still have spare places on the excursion to Calais too, and are running local excursions at the same time for people who might need to go home on the Sunday for work the next day. You can find information about the event at britakongreso.org.

Tim also presented us with a proposal for 2020 which looked promising, subject to drawing up a budget. He, Viv and Clare are going to look further into this.

Other

You'll have noticed that this issue of Update is being edited by Maurizio Giacometto, as was the previous one. We wanted to extend our thanks to Maurizio for coming on board and taking on the work. Dankon, Rico!

Tim's been working on a new online home for *La Brita Esperantisto* and let us know that some of the recent issues have now been added as separate articles in text form. He's also been looking into creating an EPUB version of future issues, which we agreed we'd like him to try producing, starting with the next issue. He's also been digitising some archive materials, some of which are planned for use at the *Kunkongreso* in a presentation which Ivor Hueting is set to give. He started with talks from Ivo Lapenna and Marjorie Boulton from notable events in Esperanto history.

We ended the meeting saying farewell to our colleague Kathryn Newbould, who has had the good fortune to move to Sweden in recent months, settling down with her partner of several years. We wish the pair of them lots of luck and happiness for the future.

2019 AGM

The charity's AGM will take place at The Ark, Noahs Ark Road, Dover CT17 0DD on Saturday, April 13th, 2019 at 10:00.

Members of EAB will be able to vote on the candidacies for trusteeship of the people who have proposed themselves for the role. There are seven candidates for ten available places. Ian Carter is the sole candidate for president.

This issue of Update comes with the usual pre-AGM paperwork, including an extract from the accounts. The full set, should you wish to consult it, is publicly downloadable from the Charity Commission's site.

A new accounting standard came into effect last year which means it is no longer possible to show surpluses or deficits before factoring in unrealised gains, which are financial movements outside of anyone's control and don't

actually represent money either coming in or out of the Charity. We can't just enter a line in the accounts labelled "surplus/deficit" and showing operational performance anymore.

Instead, we have to factor in how the value of our investments has changed over the previous year. Since that rather helpful piece of information can't appear explicitly in the accounts, we'll state it here: the Charity had an underlying surplus (difference between income and expenditure) of £2k.

Please note that the deadline for submitting postal votes and nominating proxies is **April 5th**. In order to facilitate the smooth running of the AGM, the Trustees request that anybody wishing to propose substantial changes to the draft AGM minutes submit them to the office by the same date.


